DO YOU PAY OHIO INCOME TAX? THERE IS A WAY TO PAY LESS.

Not only is it legal, but it is ethical, and it is a way to benefit Messiah Lutheran School. This year, when you prepare your tax returns, do the following:




- 1. Take a look at line eight on your Ohio Individual Tax Return do you have a tax liability?
- 2. If yes, would you like to reduce it by \$750 (or \$1500 if filing jointly)
- 3. If yes, don't file your taxes just yet, but do the following:
 - a. Go to LSGOohio.org/givetomessiah/ (Lutheran Scholarship Granting Organization) and follow the links to donate \$750 (joint filers have to do separately for each filer)
 - b. Be certain to select Messiah Lutheran as the recipient
 - c. When you receive your official letter of receipt, enter your donation as a Non-refundable Credit on your Ohio tax return and subtract if from what you owe.
 - d. Now file your taxes, sit back and wait for your refund.

Owe less than \$750 (\$1500 joint) in Ohio taxes, simply give Messiah School (through LSGO) what you do owe, then you pay nothing to Ohio. Last year, your fellow Messiah Church members transferred their taxes of \$37,400 to Messiah School. Come join them.



PASTOR'S PONDERINGS



We enter into the third month of a new year. Are you still feeling like it is a new year, or have you fallen into the same old routine? Last month, I challenged you to search for the new, the intriguing, and the opportunities for this new year. In our Adult Education time we talked about being curious. How are you doing with all that? I'm excited by what I'm reading and hearing from God. My ponderings have been invigorated. How about yours? This is what I've been hearing and pondering lately:

- On March 2 we'll hear how Jesus goes up the mountain with Peter, James and John, and is transfigured before their very eyes. It is an amazing event that often challenges us. This time, I was caught by the voice from the cloud: "This is my Son, my Chosen; Listen to him!" Whoa there, wait a minute, you are commanding (notice the exclamation point) us to listen to Jesus? Well, maybe we better focus on what Jesus has to say, not the detail of how his face changed, how Moses and Elijah showed up, or how Peter wants to build three dwellings. Just what has Jesus got to tell us that we need to hear and follow?
- On March 9 we'll hear how Jesus was tempted in the desert after being filled with the Holy Spirit at his baptism. Wait a minute; after being baptized, claimed as God's beloved Son, and filled with the Holy Spirit, Jesus is tempted? But we too are baptized. How come we aren't tempted like Jesus? Oh but wait, we are! Tempted to do the things we want to do. Tempted to spend on ourselves. Tempted to worship the gods of work, societal actives, and self-interest. Jesus relied on the Bible to challenge his temptor; so can you.



- On March 16 we'll hear that Herod wants to kill Jesus, but Jesus is too busy doing his work to be at all concerned. Jesus also expresses compassion for Jerusalem, the city, and its inhabitants. Jerusalem is in need of reform; it needs to return to following God, God's will, and God's desires. Jesus longs for our city, state, and country to reform too.
- On March 23 we'll hear Jesus say more about reforming. Jesus wants us to bear the fruit of God's kingdom. The fruit that is for the benefit of the greater good, not just for the benefit of a few, or the benefit of the one.
- On March 30 we'll hear Jesus tell the parable of the prodigal. Often, we equate this story as of the prodigal son, but could this be about the prodigal father? Prodigal means reckless; isn't that how the father acts? Welcoming the wayward son home, enveloping the son with love, and celebrating the return of the son? That is reckless behavior. But that is how our Father in heaven responds to our

coming back into God's household. Jesus wants us to know we have a great Father, a recklessly in love with us Father.



Let us each ponder how our actions enhance the common good. Everyone can't do everything, but everyone can do something.




ASH WEDNESDAY PRIMER

Ash Wednesday is recognized on the first day of Lent and occurs 40 days (not counting Sundays) before Easter. Since it is tied to Easter, which is a "moveable feast," Ash Wednesday falls on different dates each year. It can be as early as February 4 or as late as March 10, so this year is one of the latest dates.

Ash Wednesday derives its name from the practice of placing ashes on the forehead as a sign of repentance. The ashes used are made from burning the palm branches used in last year's Palm Sunday celebration.

At the Ash Wednesday worship service, the minister marks the sign of the cross using the ashes while pronouncing the words of scripture: Remember; "You are dust, and to dust you shall return." These words from Genesis 3:19 are God's words spoken to Adam as he was punished for disobeying God's command.



In ancient Jewish tradition, penitential people covered themselves with ashes as a sign of their remorse and humbleness as they asked God for forgiveness of their sins. Job, in recognizing the power of God, is humbled and declares; "therefore, I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes." (Job 42:6) Our practice is a bit cleaner, but is intended to be the same sort of sign of repentance, humbleness, and reliance upon God.

These forty days of Lent are meant as a time of repentance and reliance. We repent for those things we have done that dishonor God and dishonor God's creation. We repent for doing those things that damage the relationship we have with God and the relationship we have with others. And we come to the recognition, like Job, that God is in control. We recognize that we are unable, on our own, to be absolved of our sins. We are totally reliant upon God not only for our forgiveness, but for everything for which we are blessed.

Therein, comes the practice of "giving something up for Lent." In Luke 18:22, Jesus tells the rich man to "Sell all that you own and distribute the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." Jesus wants to know that all that we have is a gift from God; nothing belongs to us, everything is God's. Jesus wants to be certain we don't want to hang onto our stuff so much that we put it above God.

Can you recognize something of which you would have a difficult time letting go? Is there something you just refuse to give up? That might be an idol for you. You might be like the rich man in Luke and not be willing to let go of it and follow God.



And so, is there something you can find that you can give up and give to the poor? You see, just giving up something is only part of Jesus' command. We must be willing to give to those who are in need.

Prayer: Generous and gracious God, remind me today that it all belongs to you, and help me to embrace generosity, let go of my treasures, and trust you. Amen.



At the Easter Vigil we wait with God while the Son lies in the tomb and look forward to the morning when the Light of the World will break forever the bondage of death and declare life for us all.

Water plays an important part of our Christian story and the sacrament of Baptism. As a unifying symbol of our relationship with each other, you are invited to bring a vessel of water from home and contribute your portion to the Baptismal waters we will use during the Thanksgiving at the Font. During the offering, you will be encouraged to come forward with your offering and to pour your water into the font.

This is the night! This is the dawning of our new birth in Christ! Thanks be to God.

ALL ABOUT HOLY WEEK AT MESSISH



Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday and proceeds through Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Vigil and Resurrection Sunday. This is the defining season of Christianity and you are encouraged to grow closer to your Savior by fully participating in all these worship experiences.



Palm Sunday,

Saturday April 12 at 5:30 pm Sunday April 13 at 8:30 & 11:00 am

On this day, united with Christians around the world, we mark Jesus' triumphant entry in to the holy city of Jerusalem to

complete the work of our salvation. We follow his footsteps as we enter the church, our Jerusalem, acclaiming the one whose throne was the cross.¹

Worship Pattern: On Sunday, we gather in the church office area with palms and joy to interactively read of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. The children will lead us with instruments as we process into the worship space and continue worship in the usual pattern. See the separate article about the uncoupling of Palm/Passion. Between services we will enjoy a pancake breakfast.



Maundy Thursday, April 17 at 12:00 & 7:00 pm

On this night we begin the Three Days during which we participate once again in the saving power of Jesus' passing over from death into life. The Maundy Thursday service includes the words of Jesus' new commandment (*madatum*, from which *Maundy* comes) to love one another. On this night in which Jesus was handed over to death we also gather around the Lord's supper. At the service conclusion, the altar area is stripped of furnishings as a sign of

Jesus' abandonment.¹

Worship Pattern: We will gather in the Atrium to experience the Living Last Supper and join some First Communicants in receiving Christ's body and blood. Service concludes with silent procession to the worship space where we sing *Were You There*, followed by the solemnity of stripping the chancel.

Good Friday, April 18 at 12:00 & 8:30 pm

At the heart of this service is the passion reading according to John, which celebrates Christ's victory on the cross. As Jesus draws all people to himself, we pray for the whole world for which Christ died. Finally, we honor the cross as the sign of forgiveness, healing, and salvation. With all God's people we are invited to before this mystery of faith. Christ has died, so that we may live. ¹


Worship Pattern: We gather in silence, pray for one another, hear God's Word, glorify the cross, and ponder what Christ did for us and the whole world. At the 8:30 service we will worship in the Tenebrae tradition of darkness and shadows.



Easter Vigil April 19 at 8:30 pm

As we wait with God while the Son lies in the tomb, we gather together to look forward to the morning when the Light of the World will break forever the bondage of death and declare life for us all. This is the night! This is the dawning of our new birth in Christ! Thanks be to God!

Worship Pattern: we gather outside (weather permitting) to light the new fire from which we light the paschal Candle and hold it high for all to see and proclaim the central part of our faith; that we are claimed by God, cleansed by God, and renewed in the death and resurrection of God's Son. We then move indoors to the usual worship space where we will hear and sing the story of our faith; from creation to resurrection.



Resurrection Sunday, April 20 at 6:30, 9:00 &11:00 am Every Sunday in worship, the church celebrates the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit gathers us to receive again the gifts of God that come to us through Christ, the saving Word. On this day, we rejoice anew. Easter is the day of all days. The tomb could not keep Jesus. As Christ is risen, we too shall be raised. Come, join with all the faithful across the world as we raise our voices in triumphant song and share the meal of Holy Communion which Christ set before us. Alleluia! Christ is Risen! He's Risen indeed! Alleluia!

Worship Pattern: Sunrise service at Bain Park begins our jubilant celebration of Christ's resurrection. Breakfast at church will follow. The other two morning worship services will celebrate the

triumphant resurrection of Jesus with brass, song, fresh flowers and shouts of; He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!

LAUNDRY LOVE

PEOPLE ARE THE POINT. NOT THE MISSION.

Laundry Love calls us to live lives that return. Showing up at Leo's Laundromat and The Wash House every month is a practice of presence and a commitment that all Laundry Love Care Teams and locations adhere to. This is what differentiates Laundry Love from other hygiene initiatives.

Within the four walls of a laundromat you meet your neighbors, you meet people from different parts of the world and different cultures—all with interesting and heartbreaking experiences and stories. The laundromat is one of the most beautifully diverse places in America. We sometimes say, "If you want to meet the world, just walk into your local laundromat."

We choose to enter Laundromats NOT only to make a difference, we choose to enter laundromats so those we serve make us different. Reciprocal transformation through mutuality! Time is a gift. Time builds relationships and trust. When you spend several hours each month inside a Laundry Love laundromat, you build relational equity and community with the guests you serve. This is the core of Laundry Love.

I recently read that "Budgets are Moral Documents." Laundry Love Messiah is like countless other Lutheran social service providers. We are highly transparent, effective, and trustworthy with our grants, and donor support. Our non-partisan work helps us to earn the trust of neighbors and community leaders alike. We believe it's crucial to create a way for all people to live with dignity, and for our guests/friends to be afforded the opportunity — even in seemingly small ways — to care for themselves and their families.

Food insecurity has steadily risen since before the pandemic, with 65% of food banks recording an increase in the number of people served in October 2024 compared to October 2023. From September to October of last year, about half the food banks in the survey saw an increase in the number of people served, with an average increase of about 15% more people.

This is a tough time of year for food pantries. Many donors head south for the winter, and yet need increases because so many hungry children are out of school for Snow Days and national holidays. Our Messiah School first-grade class has decided to serve their community this year by creating Birthday Kits for local food pantries. They are collecting items and assembling birthday kits to help low-income families have a great birthday—even if they are facing food insecurity. At Messiah School, we believe in stepping back to let young leaders shine, fostering a sense of community and friendship.

Our Laundry Love Messiah Care Teams serving at Leo's and The Wash House LOVE our guests, realizing that each person carries a story that is original to them and requires patience, graciousness, and discernment. Thank you for letting me love you, too.




THE MESSIAH SCHOOL DIFFERENCE: FAITH MENTORS

Lutheran A faith mentor is a person who helps others grow in their faith through guidance and support. They are often Christians who are a few steps ahead in their faith journey.

At a recent Chapel service, each class (Preschool through 5th Grade) met their official Messiah School Faith Mentor–a designated Messiah Church

member who prays for and encourages each class.
